## Good Things Happening Around Freeport.....



Freeport Friends organized a calling program and volunteers to check in on friends and neighbors, reassuring folks that Freeport is a community made up of people who are looking out for one another. So far 2,198 calls have been made by 49 volunteers. Requests for assistance were provided, including one volunteer (Town Councilor Piltch) helping to set up a new computer so the person who lived alone did not feel so isolated. Thanks to Tawni, Leslie, Meghan and Melanie for this program and for the concern and caring they once again have shown for their community members;

*LLBean* has been helping with food distribution and making masks;

North Sails Shop (South Freeport) has been making masks;

Doherty's Store in North Freeport has been sending pizza to healthcare workers at MidCoast Hospital;

Maine Craft Distilling, owned by Freeporters Kim and Luke Davidson, donated \$3,000 to the Full Plates, Full Potential Emergency Fund to help sustain access to healthy meals for kids. They also altered part of their distillery operations to make hand sanitizer and offer it at VERY low cost.

And to all the other wonderful acts of kindness we are hearing about and to the ones which go unnoticed, thank you for showing that Freeport is truly a community that cares.

Freeport is launching the Freeport Grocery Buddy program to assist our senior neighbors over 65 and those with autoimmunity illnesses during the coronavirus pandemic.

The Freeport Grocery Buddy Program is here to assist these residents who do not have help in physically getting to the grocery store to shop for food or other essential items or to deliver the items they have ordered through Bow2go. The Freeport Grocery Buddy program will allow our older residents or those with autoimmunity illnesses to take extra precautions during this time by not having to worry about having to go to the grocery store.

Eligible residents will purchase Shaw's or Bow Street gift cards in \$50.00 increments through the Town by paying with a credit card and share their prepared shopping list with a Town employee. A volunteer will pick up your list and your purchased gift card(s) from Town Hall and make arrangements with you to drop off your items. If you have already purchased your items through Bow2go and only need your groceries picked up and delivered, volunteers are ready to help with deliveries only as well.

If you would like someone to shop for you: Please call 207-865-4743 x121 and leave a message with your name and phone number if you are interested in this service. A Town employee will call you back to walk you through the process step by step.

## From the Freeport Sustainability Advisory Board

April 22nd will mark the 50th anniversary of Earth Day. The State of Maine had planned to implement a state-wide ban on single-use plastic bags on Earth Day, 2020.



However, in response to COVID-19, the implementation has been postponed until Jan 15, 2021.

Here are 10 ways to celebrate Earth Day, while following Maine's Stay at Home order:

- 1. Calculate your carbon footprint online <u>carbon footprint</u> and find ways to decrease your footprint.
- 2. Create an Earth Day poster with your kids, take a photo and send it to Natural Resources Council of Maine <a href="mailto:nrcm@nrcm.org">nrcm@nrcm.org</a>. They'll share artwork on their website.
- 3. Start seedlings for a vegetable garden.
- 4. Decrease the waste you generate by following the 3 R's: Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Use ecomaine's 'Recyclopedia' to learn more about what's recyclable and what's not.
