many families from Portland and Falmouth making the return trip after spending the morning exploring Freeport.

Town Engineer Al Presgraves reports that the Town's selected contractor for the Landfill Closure project, R.I. Grondin & Sons of Gorham, Maine, completed all work on the project on June 2nd, 2016. Construction was started on May 24, and was completed in less than two weeks. Work included re-grading the waste, then adding a layer of intermediate cover soil, two layers of clay with a total thickness of 18 inches, and 6 inches of topsoil. A consultant provided full-time construction inspection and soil testing, with reports sent to the Maine DEP. There will be no change to the regular operation of the Transfer Station from a user's perspective, however the small amount of waste that had been disposed in the demolition landfill will now be placed in the demolition debris roll-off container for off-site disposal.

Reminder - Browntail Moth Outbreak Please take Precautions

- Avoid places heavily infested with caterpillars whenever possible.
- In late June, the larvae spin rough cocoons (webs), often on the underside of boats, deck furniture



and on the eaves of houses and sheds. These cocoons are full of hairs and at this stage the hairs are extremely toxic. The toxin is very stable and remains a hazard for a number of years. Removing cocoons from any eaves, boats, furniture and trees should only be done with great caution (always wet down areas prior to removing cocoons).

- Take a cool shower and change clothes after any activity that might involve contact with browntail moth hairs.
- Dry laundry inside during June and July to avoid the hairs getting into clothing.
- Wear long sleeves and pants tightly closed at the neck, wrists and ankles when performing activities that stir up caterpillar hairs such as: mowing, raking, weed whacking and removing pupal webbing from eaves and boats.

Caterpillar hairs can cause a sever rash (similar to poison ivy) and breathing problems.

Consult your physician if you develop a severe reaction to the browntail moth.
