- Mandy MacPherson, Co-Chair Freeport Sustainability Advisory Committee: Updates on climate action plan. She outlined the many actions already taken. They plan to present a final action list to the Town Council in January. The full Climate Action Plan is still in the draft process. She reviewed the ways they have promoted opportunities for public feedback and their public outreach in general. They discussed mailing a paper survey at a cost of approximately \$2,000.
- Robert Stevens, FCAN: Update on Rebate Program. \$25,000 of the \$40,000 has been awarded in rebates as of Dec. 4th, with \$19,300 being used for heat pumps, insulation and hot water heaters. They hope to return to request an additional \$35,000 previously discussed.
- Tais De Los Reyes, Athena's Cantina: Present a proposal for trial full-time food truck court at 491 US Route 1. The proposal includes allowing 5 food trucks as an accessory full time. The town owned lot next to Freeport Community Services was discussed as a potential location also. Mela Jones, Andy Arsenault and Amanda Kent spoke in support. The Council was in favor of exploring this idea.

PUBLIC HEARING: To consider action relative to proposed Text Amendments to Section 534. Solar Energy Generation Systems of Chapter 21 Freeport Zoning Ordinance regarding the maximum height standards for ground-mounted Accessory Solar Energy Generation Systems.

Cecilia Smith, Assistant Planner: This is an applicant driven text amendment to change the maximum size of the accessory ground mounted solar panels from the current 25 feet or the height of the accessory structure (whichever is less), to an increased height allowance of 35 feet. This will apply to accessory use trackers, not solar farms.

This has been through the Planning Board public hearing process where they considered the pros and cons including the unsightliness of the solar trackers and our desire to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. This change would be effective townwide. Residents in the Design Review District or the Village District would still need to have Project Review Board approval.

The problem of shading was discussed. The shading would be minimal. Panels are at their maximum height for a short period of time. The solar structures would still have to meet property setbacks. They have to meet the same setbacks as a house or deck. We use any projections from any structure to measure setbacks. The applicant, who also installs solar panels, discussed the energy efficiency of solar. He uses bifacial solar trackers because they absorb energy from both sides, so it reflects less heat back up into the air.

Large trackers install for \$75,000 to \$80,000. This includes a 30% federal tax credit till 2032. A smaller solar tracker would produce half of the energy and the costs would run \$65,000 to \$70,000. The larger trackers are the better investment.

Caroline Pelletier, Town Planner: She explained the background of the ordinance and the original 25 feet designation. This ordinance applies when you have a principle use on the site with ground mounted panels (either fixed panels or the tracker) that are feeding into the principle use of the sight. If there is extra energy it goes back to the grid. As a one or two family, you can do this with the Codes Enforcement Officer. If this is multi-family or commercial, you are subject to Staff Review Board for site plan review.

This will shift the maximum height to the maximum building height in that particular zone. The Island Zone is the one district that may have a maximum building height of 25 feet. The new language will state that the maximum height shall be 35 feet, or the maximum height set forth for the underlying zoning districts pursuant to article four of this ordinance, whichever is less.

Robert Stevens spoke in support.

Councilor Piltch is concerned about this being applied townwide. He acknowledges the shading fears and feels these may not be appropriate in some parts of town. Councilor Fournier only supports a 25-foot height maximum. Councilors Lawrence, Smith, Benoit all spoke in favor of allowing the height change.

Update on Ecomaine (Rod Regier) (15 minutes) (Video record time 01:50:54

Rod Regier: Sent a memo last week outlining our waste practices including how it's collected, where it goes, the proportions of solid waste vs recycling. Ecomaine is where the town's trash goes. It's an independent body with it's own governance and bonding authority. There will be a vote next month to bond \$35.5 million dollars for major expansions at the Ecomaine plant. This will trickle back to the town in the form of tipping fees.

Ecomaine General Manager and CEO, Kevin Roche: Presented a complete overview of Ecomaine's operations. Freeport is one of 20 owner communities at Ecomaine, holding 3.4 % of the organization. Their proposed new recycling facility, projected at \$25.8 million, includes an interconnection with the waste energy facility so that the plant will be powered by the waste coming in and processed through combustion at the waste energy facility. The other thing they also need is automation. The industry has transformed into an automated sortation system using optical sortation. They also plan a \$7.3 million expansion on landfills, which are also necessary. Improvements at the waste energy facility will cost \$2.5 million. The total bond is \$35.5 million. They plan to increase the rates associated with both recycling and solid waste.
