Kristina Egan is the director of the Greater Portland Council of Governments, a "regional plan and do" agency that serves 30 cities and towns, helping them save money through collaboration and by building shared and sustainable prosperity for the Greater Portland and Lakes region. The Council allocates about \$25M annually to road and public transportation projects, develops the long term plan for the region's transportation infrastructure, and runs the statewide Maine Clean Communities program promoting electric vehicles and clean fuels. The Council also funds the clean-up of industrial properties and readies them for economic development, provides small business loans, and advances economic development for the region. Before joining GPCOG, Kristina served as a town councilor in Freeport and was also the Director of Transportation for Massachusetts, and the Director of their South Coast Rail project, which included the award-winning South Coast Rail Economic Development and Land Use Corridor Plan. Prior to that she served as the Director of the Massachusetts Smart Growth Alliance. Kristina has an M.A. from Johns Hopkins and a B.A from Wesleyan University.

Principle is an urban design, development, and planning firm that works at the intersection of architecture, planning, design, and real estate development to deliver quality human-scale projects, and build places with lasting value.
