FIRST ORDER OF BUSINESS: TO WAIVE THE READING OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING #07-2002 HELD ON MARCH 26, 2002 AND ACCEPT THE MINUTES AS PRINTED.

MOVED AND SECONDED: TO WAIVE THE READING OF THE MINUTES OF MEETING #07-2002 HELD ON MARCH 19, 2002 AND ACCEPT THE MINUTES AS PRINTED. (Councilors Soley & Arsenault) (7 Ayes)

Chair Stevens asked for an update on how the Town is using its website and if public notices are going out. Mr. Olmstead advised that the problem with strike-throughs and underlining has been solved and he is not aware of any problems.

Chair Stevens pointed out that the following meetings have been scheduled: The Ordinance Committee is meeting tomorrow night at 6:35 p.m. in the Library. The Planning Board has a workshop scheduled tomorrow evening They will also be meeting on the 10<sup>th</sup> and looking at a proposal from Shaw's. The School Committee is meeting tomorrow night in the School Library and will begin addressing the operating budget.

SECOND ORDER OF BUSINESS: Public Comment Period—30 Minutes (Non-Agenda Items only)

MOVED AND SECONDED: To open the Public Comment Period (Campbell & Soley) (7 Ayes).

Andrew Arsenault asked what newspapers are utilized for giving public notice for meetings. Mr. Olmstead advised that a list of meetings is sent to the *Times Record*, *Portland Press Herald*, *The Forecaster* and *Shopping Notes*.

MOVED AND SECONDED: To close the Public Comment Period (Soley & Campbell) (7 Ayes).

THIRD ORDER OF BUSINESS: To take action on the following items of business as read by the Council Chairperson.

TTEM #55-2002 To consider action relative to proposed amendments to the Town of Freeport Comprehensive Plan Concerning Rural Management Areas. (Public Hearing)

MOVED AND SECONDED: That the Public Hearing be opened. (Councilors Arsenault & Regier)

Councilor Mann mentioned that Comprehensive Plan amendments require 30 days notice and he asked Town Planner, Donna Larsen if this was satisfied. She replied that the requirement has been met.

VOTE: (7 Ayes).

The following people shared their views or raised questions on the proposed amendments: Katrina Van Deusen, Tom Rumpf, Kathy Bither, Anne Hindley, Joe Migliaccio.

Councilor Soley asked if it would make sense to open all three public hearings since the answers are all beginning to merge. Other Councilors concurred.

TTEMS #56-2002 To consider action relative to adopting a New Subdivision Ordinance (Chapter 25). (Public Hearing) and ITEM #57-2002To consider action relative to proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance Regarding Subdivisions (Chapter 21). (Public Hearing).

MOVED AND SECONDED: That the Public Hearing be opened on ITEMS 56-2002 (New Subdivision Ordinance and 57-2002 (Zoning Ordinance Regarding Subdivisions) (Councilors Lowell & Arsenault) (7 Ayes)

Jane Benson read a letter into the public record from Cynthia Orcutt who was unable to attend tonight's meeting in support of the Subdivision Ordinance.

Councilor Soley provided an e-mail from the Chair of the Freeport Conservation Committee could be entered into the public record supporting the Zoning Ordinance changes.

Also speaking tonight were: Rick Hendee and John Creasy, former Planning Board members recommending support for the Subdivision changes.

# COUNCIL MEETING #08-2002 APRIL 2, 2002

Brad Guay, representing a group of large landowners, provided a PowerPoint presentation addressing development that could occur in rural areas. He discussed permitted uses, open space, housing costs, aquifers, storm water runoff, starter homes, rural lifestyles, school impacts, etc. He noted that he would love to see a Town Open Space Coordinator hired. Rick Hendee requested time to address some of the points raised by Mr. Guay.

Joe Carroll of Hunter Road, noted that a lot of people in Town are preserving open space on their own. He is frustrated at the enthusiasm shown for using other people's land. He agrees that there should be a coordinator or a group that works with large landowners in Town. He has always wanted to preserve his land. It is his investment and retirement.

Andy Cadot advised that he strongly supports the proposed amendments to the Comprehensive Plan, Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Ordinance. Brenda Tims noted her enjoyment in walking on the Beech Hill Road and asked if open space subdivision is the same as conservation subdivision, which Ms. Larsen addressed.

Jim Hatch, Executive Director of the Freeport Housing Trust, is in support of these amendments and noted the lack of affordable housing in Freeport. Joe Migliaccio, Andrew Arsenault, Anne Hindley, Tom Rumpf, David Reardon, Alan Hindley and John Pease shared their views. Discussion followed.

MOVED AND SECONDED: That the Public Hearing be closed. (Councilors Soley & Arsenault) (7 Ayes).

MOVED AND SECONDED: That Items #55-2002, 56-2002 and 57-2002 be tabled until April 9, 2002. (Councilors Mann & Lowell).

Councilor Mann advised that his amendments are not ready tonight. The Council mentioned not voting on this issue tonight. Councilor Regier wants an opportunity to discuss this with other Councilors before voting on it. Chair Stevens noted that the Council can have a workshop this Thursday if Councilors agree, and perhaps the Council can spend 30 minutes. Councilors agreed but Councilors Arsenault and Soley had conflicts. Councilor Regier asked Councilors to draft their own amendments before Thursday if at all possible.

BE IT ORDERED: That both Referendum Questions 1 and 2 be tabled indefinitely.

BE IT ORDERED: That a sum not to exceed \$565,500 is hereby appropriated for the purpose of purchasing the approved capital items. Included in this appropriation is \$24,660 for School oil tank removal and to meet said appropriation, the Chairperson of the Town Council and the Town Treasurer are authorized to use general obligation securities of the Town of Freeport in a total principal amount not to exceed \$565,000 with the discretion to fix the date, place of payment, forms and other details of the securities, and providing the sales thereof delegated to the Chairperson of the Town Council and the Town Treasurer. (Councilors Stevens & Soley).

Councilor Soley pointed out the items removed by this amendment. Mr. Olmstead noted that he omitted one item in the adoption of the 5 Year Plan under Comprehensive Town Improvements, The Oak Avenue project has been moved from '05 to '03.

Councilor Soley asked for more information on the proposed Police Department mobile data terminals that Chief

Scofield provided. Councilor Campbell noted that she wants to lend support to this initiative in light of September 11. She is aware of how busy the dispatcher is. Councilor Regier noted that he supports this item.

Chief Fournier expressed disappointment in cutting the \$65,000 Ladder One Waterway and the reasons it is needed. He agreed with cutting the traffic light system valued at \$30,000. He suggested postponing the fire engine rust repair to next year. He can fix the hole where the driver gets in and slow down the rust. He noted the safety issues involved in this. He does not expect to get any money from the federal government. Discussion followed on safety issues.

MOVED AND SECONDED: To amend the motion to add back the Ladder One Waterway. (Councilors Regier & Arsenault) VOTE: (7 Ayes).

MOYED AND SECONDED To delay the \$18,000 for Fire Engine Rust Repair to next year (Councilors Soley & Arsenault)

Mr. Olmstead wanted assurance that delaying this repair would not impact the goal of getting 20 years of life out of this vehicle. Chief Fournier believes that he can extend the life of the vehicle 20 years.

VOTE: (7 Ayes).

<u>Public Works</u>—Backhoe Replacement Councilor Mann advised that he reviewed the 1991 backhoe and feels that it is in relatively good shape and could use some repairs. Mr. Plummer disagreed and feels it definitely needs to be replaced.

MOVED AND SECONDED: To remove the backhoe replacement. (Councilors Mann & Soley)

Discussion followed. Chair Stevens agreed with Mr. Plummer and offered to leave it in. Other Councilors concurred.

**VOTE:** (1 Aye) (6 Nays).

Comprehensive Town Improvements—Councilor Lowell noted that the Oak Street drainage improvements is being moved up to the year 2003. Rodney Curtis advised that this is acceptable provided the Exxon does not expand. Mr. Olmstead noted that the Town Planner has been alerted to this issue. Councilor Soley is confident that the work needs to be done but this is a problem in the Village area. He suggested that Mr. Plummer prioritize these types of issues. Mr. Plummer feels that the developer should take care of this issue.

Webster Road ATL Lane—Councilor Mann noted that this road is rural and flat and can be easily bicycled on without a bicycle lane.

MOVED AND SECONDED: To delete the Webster Road ATL Lane for \$11,000. (Councilors Mann & Campbell).

Councilor Soley advised that the road is well used and dangerous. Discussion followed. Mr. Plummer explained what is going to be done on Webster Road.

VOTE: (2 Ayes—Mann & Campbell) (5 Nays).

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# Joint Councils Meeting with 5 Towns

Councilor Campbell explained that she attended and learned about group purchases. Computer purchases were discussed and this is something the Town should keep in mind.

# Police—Mobile Data Terminals

Councilor Campbell noted that she would like to increase the \$24,000 to \$25,000.

MOVED AND SECONDED: To raise the appropriation for the Police to \$25,000. (Councilors Campbell & Arsenault). <u>VOTE</u>: (7 Ayes).

ROLL CALL VOTE: (7 Ayes).

# **OTHER BUSINESS:**

Councilors Mann and Regier announced that the Council just adopted a capital budget without any bonding.

MOVED AND SECONDED: To introduce an item not on the printed agenda. (Councilor Soley & Arsenault) (7 Ayes)

He explained that he met with Mr. Cummings and the Conservation Commission to discuss purchasing his land that abuts Florida Lake. They worked out a contract that purchases 15 acres. The contract is attached and Mr. Cummings requested that the Council move quickly on this matter.

To consider action relative to an Agreement for the Purchase and Sale of Real Estate.

**BE IT ORDERED:** That the Agreement for the purchase and sale of Real Estate dated March 30, 2002 between Ronald H. and Dorothy V. Cummings and the Town of Freeport for a portion of lot or parcel of land described in Freeport Tax Assessor's Map 17, Lot 43 be approved.

<u>BE IT ORDERED:</u> That the Town Manager be authorized to sign the agreement on behalf of the town and be authorized to expend funds for a title search, property survey, legal expenses and environmental and other studies if needed.

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED: That a grant award from the NSFWS North American Wetlands Conservation Council in the amount of \$50,000 be accepted to provide funds for the purchase of the Cummings property, related expenses and to perform Wetlands Restoration and related activities. (Councilors Soley & Regier) ROLL CALL VOTE: (7 Ayes).

### David,

I cannot attend the public hearing Tuesday evening on amending the Town's zoning ordinance to provide for open space subdivisions. I do wish to voice my support, however, for the proposed amendments and am hopeful that you will pass along this email to the full Council at the public hearing. Several years ago, the Town accepted the Open Space Plan as part of the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The Open Space Plan called for review of existing land use regulations to make such regulatons more effective in conserving open space. The Planning Board has done an admirable job in revising the subdivision regulations to help preserve and maintain open space in Freeport. The proposed open space subdivisions will go a long way towards ensuring that Freeport retains wildlife habitat, unfragmented blocks of land, and land for passive recreation. As a Freeport resident who lives in a subdivision, I know how subdivisions can carve up the landscape into discrete lots with no permanent protection of valuable open space. While the Town is pursuing purchase of open space with the help of the bond passed a few years ago, such purchases cannot on their own stem the tide of sprawl. A multifaceted approach is required to work towards maintaining open space in Freeport. I urge the Town Council to vote for the Planning Board's proposal. Thank you.

### Freeport Town Council-

I am not able to attend tonight's meeting due to child care issues. I have asked Jane to read you this letter so my voice may be heard concerning this very important issue.

I am a registered Landscape Architect in the State of Maine and have been a lead designer in a land-use based practice for over 22 years. During this time I have seen the results of both good and bad planning and how this planning can affect our environment, communities and taxes. The current Freeport subdivision ordinance is an antiquated code, based on thinking that evolved during the 1950s and 1960s. Fifty years ago there was little understanding of how development patterns would affect wildlife, watersheds, traffic, social behavior and ultimately the budgets of those municipalities charged with administering to a community that sprawled itself over a wide landscape.

During the past decade many have come to see the devastating results of suburban sprawl; loss of open space, fracturing of communities and bankrupt municipalities. During the past decade we have also come to understand that there is a better way to accommodate growth, especially growth of single family homes, by far the most popular form of housing in this country. Conservation subdivisions concept of development similar to the ordinance change you are being asked to consider tonight offers a far more intelligent way to grow, create a density of lots in order to preserve meaningful open space. This new approach to subdivisions has worked brilliantly where implemented elsewhere, including many fine examples here in New England.

I am asking all of you to be bold tonight and support a well-tested, improved subdivision ordinance that will help us preserve the rural character of Freeport, strengthen our community and reduce our tax burden for now and for the generations to come. Thank-you for your thoughtful consideration and for your support of Conservation Subdivisions.
