Chair Soley read the Boat Yard Rules to the public.

Grady Newman mentioned that Emmy Dunning had boats for sale and vehicles and motors stored outside. He disagrees that the trailer is a disposal container but is being used for storage.

Bob Stevens noted that he lives 200 yards away and is opposed to the trailer that is stored in the boat yard as well as some other things. He has asked Mr. Becker if there is anyway to screen it. Things have been much neater in the yard recently but the trailer is

still there and is painted an ugly shade of green. Mr. Stevens read a letter into the record from Heidi and Tonee Harbert stating their opposition to the trailer as well as anything being stored outside of the boathouse except boats.

Hugh Phelps of Porter's Landing was supportive of maintain this property as a boat yard. He has become dismayed with the trailer and arrival of junk. He is skeptical that Mr. Becker wants to be a good neighbor.

Howard Neilsen of Pine Street likes living in a real town with real people who do real things. He feels that boat yards are not neat places

John Carp of Flying Point noted that Mr. Becker has signed a contract with the Town. He has been working long hours to put food on his table.

John Lowe of North Freeport pointed out that this is a piece of Town property and it should be kept as neat and clean as every other piece of Town property.

John Lannon of West Street agrees that the property has been a bit messy but recognizes that this is a struggling business. He would like to see everyone concerned talk to each other and not allow the controversy to continue.

Sue Morejon of Estes Drive shared her experience in hiring Mr. Becker and how they had to work with the tides. The Town purchased this property as a commercial boat yard not a park. She mentioned that bartering is done all along the coast and Mr. Becker accepted a vehicle in payment for his services.

Richard DeGrandpre pointed out that the marine industry is a small business and everybody can't get by working 8-5. He suggests that the Town work with Mr. Becker to help him work with his neighbors.

Robert Greenleaf works out of South Freeport Harbor. He also worked at B.I.W. where chemicals are stored in six tractor trailer trucks.

Andrew Arsenault recalled vehicles owned by Emmy Dunning and the fact that he never took them all home at night. He pointed out that the neighbors should not be hypocritical about trying to control the view.

Dick Doucette of Lower Mast Landing Road mentioned that there is a tractor trailer parked across from his home that the CEO indicated he cannot do anything about. Grittys also has two trailer boxes that they are using for storage even though the Planning Board did not approve them.

Ann Loth lives a mile away and drives by the boat yard 4-6 times a day. She likes all the stuff that is there. What is pretty to one person is not always pretty to another.

Tom Ring pointed out that the boat yard was zoned Marine Industrial since the 70's. The trailer is a part of the marine industry.

George Waterman of Cushing Briggs owns a marine construction business. He built floats and ramps at the boat yard during the off season and heard that some of the neighbors didn't like his operation. He regretted that anyone unhappy with him, wouldn't come directly to him to work out the problems. He suggested that the line of communications be kept open.

Elaine Rantuccio of South Street likes the boat yard and hopes that the neighbors will talk to Mr. Becker.

Mr. Stevens pointed out that the people in the neighborhood were supportive of keeping the marine zone and that Emmy Dunning was a terrific part of the neighborhood. He did have working vehicles.

Rod Regier of South Street indicated that he would like to keep the boat yard in existence but has problems with the way it looks, the existing trailer and the cars that were for sale.

Mr. Becker thanked everyone for coming out. He explained that he has been six months cleaning out the previous tenant's junk which has been done at his expense and on his time. Incidentally, he has only been contacted by one neighbor. He mentioned all the services he offers at this location. He is not in the auto business. He did use poor judgment by offering a personal car for sale at the edge of the property. The car was checked out by the Police and it was decided that there was no problem. He feels that problems can be worked out by talking. He cannot go to Site Plan Review to take the wheels off the trailer because be does not own the property. He does not have any signage or any lighting on the property. He submitted a list of 80 names of people that are supportive of his operation.

Janie Hilton likes the boat yard and would like to see more boats there. She wanted the record to reflect that Emmerson Dunning did not leave any trash behind when he vacated the property.

Kathleen Sullivan doesn't like looking at trash from her window. She does not feel the neighbors can go and talk to Mr. Becker and communication is supposed to work both ways.

Heidi Bishop suggested that the neighbors try to give Mr. Becker a helping hand.

Thomas Ring pointed out that if Mr. Becker can provide a receipt for hauling trash, it becomes "cargo".

Councilor Mann advised that he was pleased to chair the Dunning Boat Yard Committee. The property was divided into two parts and half of it was leased as a boat yard. This generates an income to fund the improvements that have been made there without relying on property taxes. He agreed that the first tenant did leave behind a lot of things and boats. He feels that Rules 33 and 34 being proposed to the lease will be unproductive. He feels that the Town is fortunate to have Mr. Becker and the only thing he would suggest is that the Town schedule regular meetings with Mr. Becker to make sure the arrangement is working.

MOVED AND SECONDED: That the Public Hearing be closed. (Councilors Arsenault & Campbell (7 Ayes).

MOVED AND SECONDED: That Item #232-98 be tabled until December 15, 1998. (Councilors Arsenault & Campbell (7 Ayes).

Karen Martin of the Greater Portland Council of Government explained that the Freeport Elders' Association was awarded a \$50,000 State grant to expand their services. The proposed expansion of services is to acquire a van to be used for road trips and to fund a staff person to help them coordinate their programs. The Council needs to decide whether to accept this one-time only grant and move forward with the paperwork to get the Town under contract in order to receive the \$50,000. She offered to answer questions.

Councilor Beaulieu suggested tabling this item because she is concerned that if the elders went ahead with their planned purchases, the Town might have to pour more money into their association during the next budget period. She indicated that she is for the grant but is concerned about the budget. Other Councilors indicated that they did not want to hold up the grant. Amy Adams and Lynda D'Amico both urged the Council to accept the grant and allow the Elders to get help administratively and purchase a van.

MOVED AND SECONDED: That the Public Hearing be closed. (Councilors Campbell & Soule (7 Ayes).

MOVED AND SECONDED: To table this item until December 15, 1998 and request that the Town Manager work up information about the total cost of what it would cost for either the Town taking on the duties of the van and the staff person and also what

the costs would be for the Elders to take on those responsibilities as a comparison. The Town Manager should also look into whether FCS also wants to get involved. (Councilors Beaulieu & Soley) (2 Ayes-Beaulieu & Soley) (5 Nays).

Mr. Olmstead recommended that the Town look at a contract situation for the employee to be contracted directly by the Elders. The van issue can wait.

Kevin Kelly of the Freeport Economic Development Commission presented a set of guidelines for Tax Increment Financing to encourage economic development in the

Town of Freeport. He feels it is important to diversify the tax base in Freeport. Other towns already offer these types of financing programs. The State strongly recommends that Freeport develop these guidelines. He introduced Jack Lufkin.

Councilor Mann asked about the \$500 non-refundable fee and mentioned that it is not clear who gets the money. He also referred to the top of page 2 concerning a 1% administrative fee and it is not clear where the fee is supposed to go.

MOVED AND SECONDED: To take up an item not on the printed agenda. (Councilors Campbell & Beaulieu) (6 Ayes) (1 Nay-Mann).

MOVED AND SECONDED: To amend the guidelines as follows: On Page 2, second line, add the words "payable to the Town of Freeport" after 1 percent annual administrative fee and add to Page 2, Item 5, "to FDEC" after non-refundable fee; on Page 2, Line 2 add the word "tax" after the word "total". (Councilors Campbell & Beaulieu) (7 Ayes).

BE IT ORDERED: That the proposed Tax Increment Financing Guidelines be adopted as amended. (Councilor Campbell & Arsenault) (6 Ayes) (1 Nay-Mann).

Chair Soley thanked Mr. Kelly and Mr. Lufkin for their hard work in developing these guidelines.

2. Discussion on committee assignments, Council goals for the coming year, and the proposed meeting schedule.

Chair Soley advised that the 2/16 regular meeting is being canceled. An extra meeting with the Planning Board will be added.

Council Committee Appointments—Chair Soley noted that most everyone got their first choice except for Mr. Arsenault but he got his second and third choices. Chair Soley explained some of the committee functions. Mr. Olmstead noted that each committee elects its own chair.

Mr. Olmstead asked if the Appointment Committee could meet on December 8 at 6 p.m. since there are several vacancies on different boards because of terms expiring and resignations. Councilors concurred and Mr. Olmstead will send out an agenda.

David Soley and I have been working through the Hown Manager to try to correct the situation; however, these efforts have been to no avail.

The Town Council has the responsibility of fixing any problems that have resulted from lensing the property. At the October 20th Council meeting, a motion was made to set a public hearing to discuss amending the rules for the Dumning Boot Mand (see amended shout).

I urge you to attend this public hearing to express your opinions on changes to the Dunning Bour Yard rules. If you are unable to attended the public hearing on Danamber 1st, please call me (\$65-4696) or any other councilor with your input, or send your comments in writing to: Dale Olmstead, Presport Town Hall, 30 Main Street, Presport (indicate the comments are to be included in the public hearing record).

At the October 20th meeting the Council also unanimously voted that the Town of Freepart, as owner of the Dunning Boat Yard, deny the lessee the right to go before the Planning Board with a site plan review for a storage/disposal consider. The only party that can apply for site plan seview is the property owner of record.

Dear Neighbors

I moved into the barn at the end of January which was filled inside and out with the previous tenants belongings and mess. It has been a long and teadeus process that has taken over six months to remove his boats, mess and equipment. Getting the property cleaned up from the previous tenant has been done at my expense and gift of time.

At the time of lease negotiations I offered to paint the barn, and rebuild the bulkhead, but was turned away being told that the town would do all the major maintenance. Re; painting, bulkhead, grating work... Nothing has happened on these fronts with the exception of a consulting engineer from Squall Bay stopping by to look at the property in the late spring.

At this time I do boat repair, maintenance, restoration, construction, fabrication, consulting, salvage, towing, Island freight, sales, pier, ramp, dock, mooring, diving, light crane, mast stepping, and sailing lessons. I am a small low impact marine business, doing much mobile off sight work.

I am not in the auto business, the car for sale was a personal item in need of a new owner, and the other truck was abandoned on the property and I had to have it removed through legal process. No neighbors came to me to discuss the presents on the leased property, Thou a police officer was dispatched to check the legality of it and left satisfied. A brief meeting with Dale Omsted was had and I was informed that their had been some concern as to a car being parked on the public access aria, I assured Dale that the car has always been on the leased property and not the public area as the apparent complaints had stated, Dale was satisfied and happy. I then left his office with the understanding the issue was resolved, only latter to receive a letter from Dale, hand delivered to my residence by a police officer, demanding the removal, or the matter would be turned over to the Town Attorney to commence legal action against me.

The next letter was a certified letter falsely stating that I was in violation of my lease. And the last letter I have received from the town was a proposed amendment to the Zoning ordinance.

A neighbor then gave me a copy of a letter from Genie Beaulieu to the neighbors of the dunning boat yard; I apparently am not on the mailing list to be consulted on such concerns!

Only one neighbor has come over to discuss a concern, and I believe that I have listened and addressed that concern to their satisfaction. No one else has called me to discuss any problems or concerns. My phone numbers are; H 865-2145 W 865-4567 please call or stop by at any time, I will listen!

After careful review of the proposed amendments, I would comment as both a concerned town taxpayer and customer of the yard and its facilities. I have had several occasions to employ Mr. Becker and the facility. I have found him to be knowledgeable, helpful and interested in doing what's right to conduct a successful small business enterprise.

I am a commercial lobsterman and have a lobster fishing vessel that Mr.Becker has helped maintain. I would ask that you consider the tidal issues at the yard and the inconvenience of trying to haul out or beach vessels there given your proposal disallowing parking between 10 p.m. and 6 am. In attempting to operate a commercial fishing operation, down time and repairs to a vessel are extremely critical. I have been forced to leave my truck at the yard at 1 am to get back and return to the yard for beaching by 3 am, in order to do repairs and get underway as soon as possible that morning. Such a parking restriction as proposed would have a detrimental effect on the During yard operation. I know that I'm not the only commercial fishing vessel in town to have to operate at such hours in order to conduct my business.

With regard to the proposal to ban the sale of vessels, vehicles ,etc. at the Dunning Yard. I would remind you that I can remember in the not too distant past, where the launching ramp parking lot is now situated, probably 8 to 10 vessels, some commercial and recreational boats ,were hauled out in various states of disrepair ,displayed all winter to spring and many having "For Sale" signs attached. I personally looked at several of these boats. The concept of running a boat yard without the expectation of "For Sale" signs seems askew. I can't think of a single time in the past fourteen years that I've been at Brewer's or Strout's Point Wharf Marine and not seen boats for sale. In some instances Trailers and other related items and equipment.

In conclusion, the proposed measures appear to be harsh and overly restrictive, to the operation as I know it at the Dunning Boat Yard. In total, the amendments lack the good spirit that might be interpreted from the council's stated desire to give a small business person the ability to use the yard efficiently and effectively.

I would ask that my concerns be entered as a matter or record at the Public Hearing scheduled December 1,1998 on said topic. Thank you for the attention to this matter.
